Module 1 Parliamentary Democracy

Overa	rching	Topic:
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Why is this topic being studied at this time?

How does it fit into the wider subject curriculum?

The purpose of this scheme of learning is to introduce students to the history and development of Parliament and democracy in the UK. This allows them to understand the strengths of our parliamentary system and how this contributes to a democratic society. Students will learn how voting works, what goes on in the House of Commons and House of Lords, the political parties of the UK and the role of MPs. This will both support the GCSE curriculum and introduce students to key aspects of the political life of the UK, an understanding of which will be a vital contribution to their roles as active citizens.

Joining up: The topic draws on some of the issues considered in the British Values topic. Students will consider values such as the rule of law in relation to police powers and the criminal justice system. The topic also underpins a variety of topics as students move into the GCSE in Year 10, where these issues will be considered in more depth. This will be most relevant to GCSE topics 'Political Power in the UK', 'Local and Devolved Government,' 'Where does Political Power Reside?', How do others Govern Themselves?', and 'Bringing about Political Change.'
