We will be focusing especially on narrative technique, the Victorian period and how Dickens, a master of narration and characterisation, has his place in the canon of literature. We will have many opportunities in our study for analytical writing, creative responses and contextual understanding of the Victorian Era. We will also discuss other prominent figures of the period, such as Charles Darwin, who wrote 'The Origin of Species' - arguably the most influential book of the 19 th Century. The debate of Creationism and Evolution will be explored in PRE and Science.
