Spring half-term 1, *Mythos*

Overarching Topic:			
<p>Why is this topic being studied at this time?</p> <p>How does it fit into the wider subject curriculum?</p>	<p>From the birth of Hermes to the wrath of Zeus, this unit of work will allow students to explore the fascinating stories of Greek mythology, using extracts from Stephen Fry’s critically acclaimed novel ‘Mythos’. Greek myths and legends have a huge impact on our own language, both in terms of root words and references that often make their way into our everyday speech. The stories will allow students to begin to make their own links between these ancient myths and our 21st century lives, while reading genuinely interesting stories with moral messages attached.</p> <p>Our Mythos unit will support students in their study of Oracy and Epics. Students will also study ‘Myths and Legends’ in Performance in year 7 and this unit of work will give them grounding ahead of exploring texts in a practical way. Our work on root words stems will also link to studies in MFL.</p>
